SUGGESTED BOOKS FOR HIGH SCHOOL AND ADVANCED READERS

Tehran Children: A Holocaust Refugee Odyssey by Mikhal Dekel (W.W. Norton & Co. 2019). Meticulously researched memoir tracing the footsteps of the author's father, one of one thousand Polish refugee children who escaped through Uzbekistan and Kazakhstan to the ancient Persian-Jewish community in Tehran and finally to British-controlled Palestine. 2019 National Jewish Book Award finalist.

Last Stop Auschwitz: My Story of Survival from Within the Camp by Eddy de Wind. (Grand Central Publishing 2020). First English translation of the only book known to have been written in Auschwitz, just after the liberation by the Soviet Army. De Wind, deported with his new bride from Westerbork, is forced to work as a medical assistant in a barrack close to the medical experimentation being done on his wife.

The Volunteer: One Man, an Underground Army, and the Secret Mission to Destroy Auschwitz by Jack Fairweather (Custom House 2019) reconstructs the little-known story of Witold Pilecki, the Polish cavalry officer who spent nearly three years in Auschwitz clandestinely working to undermine the Germans and inform the Allies of Nazi crimes. Costa Book of the Year award. *The Auschwitz Volunteer: Beyond Bravery* by Witold Pilecki is the first English translation of Pilecki's 1945 memoir.

Balm In Gilead: A Story From the War by John L. Withers II (Kindle edition, Lulu Publishing Services 2020). Rare account of an all-black U.S. Army Truck company, including the author's father, which rushed emergency supplies to recently liberated survivors in Dachau. The unit then sheltered two surviving boys, working together for a year in the aftermath of war-torn Europe.

SUGGESTED BOOKS FOR MIDDLE SCHOOL AND ABOVE

White Bird: A Wonder Story by R. J. Palacio (Alfred A. Knopf, 2019). In this beautifully illustrated graphic novel of rescue in Vichy-occupied France, a young Jewish girl learns that a classmate she formerly shunned has become her savior and best friend. A Sidney Taylor 2020 Gold Medalist.

Someday We Will Fly by Rachel DeWoskin (Viking Books for Young Readers, 2019). 15year-old Lillia and her family of circus performers flee Warsaw during the Holocaust and take refuge in Shanghai. Lillia seeks to use her performance skills to support her family while caring for her developmentally disabled younger sister. Winner of Sidney Taylor 2020 Gold Medalist and 2019 National Jewish Book Award.

They Went Left by Monica Hesse (Little Brown Books for Young Readers, 2020). 18-year-old Zofia, recently liberated from Gross Rosen, searches for her younger brother Abek, possibly the only family member to survive. She travels through the destruction of post-war Germany and Poland to a DP camp, meeting others who are desparately trying to re-construct their lives. Hesse is the award-winning author of **The War Outside**.

Kristallnacht

From the testimony of Susan Neulaender Faulkner, Gratz College Holocaust Oral History Archive:

"I was walking over the sidewalks with glass crunching under my feet, and on the next street — Fasanenstrasse. . . . the oldest synagogue in Berlin . . . was in flames. The firetrucks were there training their hoses on the neighboring houses, but letting the synagogue burn. And the entire sidewalk across from the synagogue was filled with hundreds of peopleas if it was like a carnival to them . . . applauding and laughing . . . flames lighting up in the sky . . . and the people standing in the reflected light, in the glow of the flames . . . laughing.I tried to walk past them in such a way that they wouldn't see that I was crying. . . . Then...... there were some brown shirts and they were beating up an old Jewish man with a long beard . . . and there were people standing around laughing and applauding . . . like a Roman circus. . . . I came home and I was promptly sick all over the kitchen floor."
