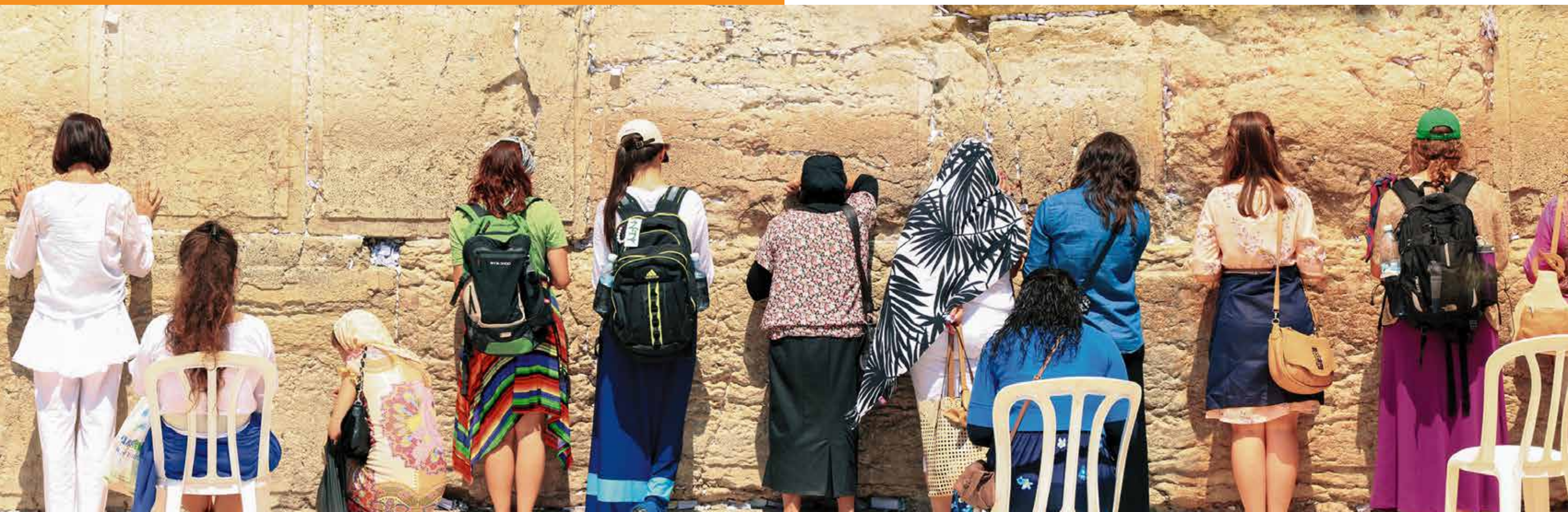
THE IMPACT OF WOMEN'S PHILANTHROPY

Each year, the Jewish Federation of Greater Philadelphia's Women's Philanthropy raises an estimated \$6 million for Jewish Community Fund-supported programs and services. But, so much more than providing philanthropic support, this empowered and empowering group of women impact the Jewish community in countless ways every year.

As a group, Women's Philanthropy remains committed to and knowledgeable of issues affecting the Jewish community so they may serve as informed leaders among their peers. They advocate on behalf of underserved populations and campaign for important issues in Harrisburg and Washington DC. They participate in meaningful mission trips and work as tireless advocates for the Jewish Federation's philanthropic endeavors in Israel and elsewhere overseas.

But it doesn't stop there. Women's Philanthropists also participate in hands-on events to engage the community — packing boxes of food to be distributed; baking challah as part of a global, grassroots movement to bring Jews together around Shabbat; and spearheading our annual High Holiday Food sort, where we collect and deploy more than 40,000 pounds of food to our area food pantries.

These activities make a difference in the lives of so many in need. But they also have a deep impact on the women participating in them. Women's Philanthropy inspires women of all ages and backgrounds to take leadership roles in their community, empowering them to learn more, do more, and share their experiences with others. Women's Philanthropy also offers tremendous bonding opportunities — for mothers, daughters and sisters, and new and lifelong friends—building a deeper richer tapestry of commitment and caring within our community.



RECOGNITION FOR YOUR SUPPORT

Few endeavors are as rewarding as helping others in need. And perhaps nothing is as empowering — both to yourself and to those who follow you — as making a philanthropic commitment in your own name. With your participation in Women’s Philanthropy, you demonstrate your leadership in your family, and in your Jewish community. In celebration of this commitment, the Jewish Federation recognizes Women Philanthropists with two leadership giving societies: Lion of Judah and Pomegranate.

LION OF JUDAH

The Lion of Judah donors are the most dynamic philanthropic Jewish women in the world, an international sisterhood of more than 17,500 global activists who care deeply about the Jewish future. Lions demonstrate dedication to the Jewish community by contributing time and resources — and set an exemplary standard of leadership and giving. Each woman makes an annual donation to the Jewish Federation of \$5,000. Collectively, Lions have raised tens of millions of dollars in support of critical projects worldwide.

Lions are recognized at the following levels of support:

At every giving level, Lions play a vital role in creating social justice, aiding the vulnerable, preserving human dignity and building Jewish identity. Every two years, Lions are invited to gather for three phenomenal days of extraordinary learning, sharing and celebration at the International Lion of Judah conference. The conference is inspirational to all who attend as it attracts the world’s leading speakers in the fields of religion, culture, art, business and politics.

A tangible reflection of deep commitment to caring for Jewish community members both near and far, Lions proudly wear a beautiful signature pin forged in the form of the Lion symbol. This pin is immediately identifiable across chapters, connecting this sisterhood internationally.

POMEGRANATE

The pomegranate is a fruit indigenous to Israel and an ancient Jewish symbol. In the Song of Songs the pomegranate is referenced symbolizing that a woman’s wisdom is abundant, like the seeds of a pomegranate. It is often used as the new fruit on the second night of Rosh Hashana, as it is said to have 613 seeds, corresponding to the 613 mitzvot. The pomegranate has also long been a symbol of fertility, and thus of the unlimited possibilities for the new year.

With this symbolism in mind, at the Jewish Federation of Greater Philadelphia, the pomegranate has become an important emblem of Jewish women’s philanthropy. With a significant annual commitment of \$1,800 made in her own name, a woman opens a world of endless possibilities for herself and her community. Women giving at this level are also recognized with a signature pin, this time representing the pomegranate.
